1 Cervical Screening SMS Reminder Service: Code error

As part of the Cervical Screening SMS Reminder Service in London, NHSE/I identified an issue which took place between 15 December 2021 and 16 March 2022. An incorrect Read code has been attached to some patients' records. However, the correct SMS message was sent to patients. This means that patients received the correct information and results directly.

Changes have been made to the processes for the adding the Read codes, which have been tested and are monitored routinely. Unfortunately, the incorrect Read codes that were sent to patients' records cannot be deleted by iPlato (the text message provider). However, instructions have been provided on how practices can do this. Please note that this is not a mandatory action for practices.

2 Upcoming changes to urgent suspected cancer (2 week wait) referral forms

In January, the pan-London Urgent Suspected Cancer Referral Forms (2 week wait referral forms) will be changing. The changes reflect feedback from primary and secondary care colleagues on how to better capture important clinical information that supports the urgent referral and investigation process.

3 Reminder about bloods and patient availability for 2ww patient pathways

Our colleagues in secondary care have asked that we remind all GPs of the importance of diagnostic tests being undertaken when patients are referred on the 2ww suspected cancer pathway. To support Trusts in straight to test pathways and the Faster Diagnosis Standard, there needs to be **up to date blood tests (within 3 months)** available to secondary care when a patient is referred. 2ww referrals without up-to-date tests can delay overall diagnosis for the patient.

The Trusts are also experiencing several missed or cancelled appointments due to patients being away on holiday or making themselves unavailable. Please remind patients that they need to be available for outpatient appointments and diagnostic tests when referred on a suspected cancer pathway.

4 Free mental health support for cancer patients

Big Health are expanding their partnership with Macmillan Cancer Support so that anyone living with or beyond cancer can access the support they need for their mental health and quality of life.

8 Important information for all primary care referrers regarding Urgent Suspected Cancer (2 Week Wait) soft tissue sarcoma referrals

The London and South East Sarcoma Network is currently experiencing high numbers of referrals for soft tissue sarcoma, with volumes impacting the start of treatment for adults with known sarcoma.

Short term mutual aid arrangements are currently in place between the Royal Marsden Hospital (RMH) and the Royal National Orthopaedic Hospital (RNOH).

NICE Guidance states that all referrers should consider <u>urgent</u> ultrasound or MRI for a suspicious lump and an Urgent Suspected Cancer (USC/2 Week Wait) referral should be made if the imaging report is suspicious. Urgent ultrasound reports should have a turnaround time of two weeks or less.

Therefore, ideally in all cases an imaging report should be arranged urgently to guide referral pathway choice. Please ensure the report is attached to the referral. Locally provided ultrasound reduces unnecessary travel and worry for patients and their loved ones, particular if travelling to known specialist centres for tests.

In addition to direct access to urgent ultrasound, there are a small number of named sarcoma diagnostic services currently accepting USC sarcoma referrals: Kingston, Croydon, West Middlesex, Brighton, Southampton and Norwich.

If sarcoma is detected, these patients will be referred by the imaging team to tertiary services at RMH or the London Sarcoma Service at RNOH/UCLH, with a copy of the advice being sent to the original referring GP.

If you cannot get direct access to an urgent ultrasound, please ensure you tick the box on the form to explain why you believe there is a high clinical risk of soft tissue sarcoma. If you suspect bone sarcoma, you should refer your patient to RNOH accompanied by x-ray results.

The Sarcoma UK Support Line is available for patients and healthcare professionals. It is open Mon-Fri 10am-3pm on 0808 801 0401. You can also email them on supportline@sarcoma.org.uk and expect a response within two business days.

Notes for local commissioners of direct access urgent ultrasound:

- Direct access urgent ultrasound should be available with a turnaround time of two weeks from time of referral
- The direct access form should clearly state whether the ultrasound is for soft tissue or bone sarcoma
- Rapid diagnostic clinics would not normally be used for sarcoma referrals.
- London region Imaging Programme, together with the London and South East Sarcoma Network, is developing a protocol and education package for sonographers so that ultrasound reporting will have one of four outcomes:
 - o **low suspicion** return to primary care with advice & guidance on next actions.
 - medium suspicion refer to local sarcoma diagnostic service OR tertiary centre if local service is too far away, for MRI and possible excision biopsy.
 - high suspicion sarcoma refer direct to tertiary sarcoma service (LSS bone and soft tissue, RMH soft tissue only).
 - o **high suspicion of a different cancer** refer direct to appropriate MDT.

9 Patient digital access to GP records

Most patients will automatically be given access (via the NHS app, other GP online services or by speaking to their GP surgeries) to more information added to their GP record from November 2022 onwards. This includes letters, test results and appointment notes. It should also include screening where information has been sent to the GP.

There will not be a mass comms campaign to launch this as practices are switching on gradually and it is only about new information that is added, rather than historical information.
