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1 FIT - Impact Investment Fund – Lower GI Referral Payments for Practices

As part of the Investment and Impact Fund (IIF), all 2WW referrals for suspected lower gastrointestinal cancer should be accompanied by a FIT result (faecal immunochemical test result), with the result recorded either in the twenty-one days leading up to the referral, or in the fourteen days after the referral.

Practices need to code faecal immunochemical test results (FIT results) to qualify for 2WW lower GI referral payments.

We have noticed activity in this area is low, and it appears to be because the FIT results are coming back into EMIS without an associated code. For this reason, practices need to take two actions:

- Associate a code with the incoming FIT results so these will be coded automatically upon receipt in future. We have written instructions on how to do this: <u>How to associate a code with incoming FIT results</u>.
- 2. Code previous FIT results, received on or after 25 March 2022, with: Quantitative faecal immunochemical test (Concept ID: 104936100000101, Description ID: 2643291000000112).

2 Improving the usage of FIT as a pre-diagnostic test in Primary Care

It has been highlighted by the Barts Lab that there continues to be a large mismatch between FIT tube stock requests and returns across many local practices. This is impacting on supply chains and has large Pathology cost implications. The pathology team would like to kindly remind all GP practices to:

 Endeavour to keep clear and up to date stock taking procedures for FIT tubes to ensure stock requests are made only when it is confirmed that stocks are running low in practices - there have been examples of additional orders being made only for large quantities from previous orders to then be found after quantities are flagged by Pathology.

- Clinicians to continue to use FIT appropriately and to avoid methods such as double sampling (providing 2 or 3 tubes at once). Only 1 tube is needed for FIT testing.
- Continue to help minimise FIT spoil rates by reception staff supporting
 patients understanding on how to complete the test further training and
 support will be ongoing in this regard. Information to support patients and

- After providing a FIT tube to patients, please safety net using templates to
 ensure receipt of the sample back to the surgery within 14 days and chase up
 if they haven't returned it. There have been instances where patients with
 worrying symptoms have been lost to follow-up when the tube is not returned.
- Please note that a pre-diagnostic FIT result greater than > 10 'Rules cancer in' for further investigation. A pre-diagnostic FIT result below 10 does <u>not</u> 'rule out' bowel cancer. Up to 10% of bowel cancers will have a FIT less than <10. BSG guidelines recommend to safety net (using safety netting templates) and follow up patients with concerning clinical features and re-assess after 6 weeks. Consider secondary care referral if there are ongoing concerns.

4 Prostate cancer update from CRUK

Urgent referrals for suspected urological cancer had one of the poorest performances during the first year of the COVID-19 pandemic. **Around 16,100 fewer people started treatment for urological cancer in England** than expected in the first year of the pandemic. This number is mainly made up of prostate cancer cases.

Incidence of prostate cancer is highest in older men, Black men, and those with family history and the recognition and referral of suspected prostate cancer can be tricky.

The PSA test is a blood test that detects the level of a protein called prostate specific antigen (PSA) in the blood. PSA is a protein produced by both normal and cancerous prostate cells and it's normal for all people with a prostate to have some PSA in their blood. PSA is used in asymptomatic and symptomatic contexts.

Here are some points to consider if you request a PSA test:

- People can have higher PSA levels as they get older
- Cancer can be present with lower PSA levels
- PSA levels can be increased by several things including UTIs, exercising vigorously and ejaculation
- Before offering a PSA test discuss the benefits and limitations of the test to enable the person to make an informed choice

5 Research study: exploration of GP and patient attitudes towards prescribing for managing low-risk non-specific symptoms

UCL's Department of Behavioural Sciences and Health (BSH) is carrying out a project which aims to understand how prescriptions are used to manage non-specific low-risk symptoms in primary care.

7 Results from the Under 16 Cancer Patient Experience Survey 2021 (for info)

The Under 16 Cancer Patient Experience Survey 2021 results are now available and show the consistently high levels of care young cancer patients receive. Cancer care providers will analyse these results in detail to learn where they could do even better.

Key results show:

- 9.01 out of 10 was the average parent/carer rating of the overall experience of their child's care
- 89% of parents/carers rated the overall experience of their child's care as 8 or more out of 10

9 Engaging on cancer signs and symptoms with older males through sport (for info)

North East London Cancer Alliance has been working for the last few months with Leyton Orient Football Club to reach out to older males who traditionally do not come forward with signs and symptoms of cancer, as part of our <u>'It's not a game'</u> campaign.

This included attending a <u>health awareness day</u> at a home game for Leyton Orient FC on 29 October. Throughout the day, we spoke to a number of local residents to highlight the importance of getting checked if you have <u>signs or symptoms</u> of cancer, as well as handing out leaflets with essential cancer information on.

10 Targeted Lung Health Check Update

We continue to scan Barking and Dagenham residents aged 55-74 who have ever smoked and have now scanned over 700 people since July 2022.

80% of GPs in Barking and Dagenham and Tower Hamlets have signed the data sharing agreement for the programme and we urgently need the remaining GPs in these two boroughs to sign up.

A BBC film crew visited the site of our Targeted Lung Health Check scanning truck in Barking & Dagenham on 9 November for a programme on BBC Newsnight, to look at the hard work we are doing to help spot cancer sooner.
