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## 1 PCN DES support guide: a reminder

#### 2 PCN cancer facilitators

## 3 Breast Screening in SMI ONEL (BHR only)

A breast screening project to support people with a Severe Mental Illness will be going live from 1 April 2024, with a staggered start date for each PCN. Information on this will be included in the updated service specification, which the PCNs can expect to receive with their contracts within the next 3-4 weeks.

Ahead of the go live, PCNs will be required to align their SMI registers with their relevant borough NELFT mental health team register. The NELFT registers will be shared via the cancer alliance, with more guidance on this to follow.

## 4 Personalised Stratified Follow Up for Cancer Patients (PSFU)/ Remote Monitoring System Update – Barts Health

Acute Trusts have been working to implement Stratified Follow Up for Cancer patients. Barts Health has made significant progress with the Breast Open Access service and continues to move forward now with more remote follow up for both Colorectal and Prostate follow up patients – eligible patients are increasingly seen in Nurse Led telephone follow up clinics.

NHS England now requires Trusts to implement digital monitoring of this cohort of patients, to ensure increased safety netting. As part of that process Barts Health, in line with other NEL Trusts, have installed a bolt on to the Somerset Cancer Registry – RMS (Remote Monitoring System).

This will allow an improved ability to track eligible patients, post treatment, to ensure all surveillance tests are conducted and reviewed in a timely fashion, with less hospital appointments just for "good news" and rapid access to outpatients and clinical teams as required.

If a patient is referred to the Barts Health Remote Monitoring Service, a typical pathway would involve and End of Treatment Clinic session with a Clinical Nurse Specialist – at which point a Treatment Summary and end of Treatment Holistic

Needs Assessment conducted. The appointment would be utilised to explain the RMS process to the patient and ensure they are familiar with any symptoms the clinical team want to be informed of and the expected follow up protocol.

The patient will then receive a "welcome" letter; followed by a "reminder" letter for the first surveillance test – shortly followed by a "results" letter. This will repeat until the programme of follow up is complete and the patient is discharged to primary care – which is the final letter. GPs will be copied into all correspondence, with a separate dedicated letter to the GP at the point of discharge.

At any point during the process the patient can be transferred back into regular follow up if required. Please note there isn't any action required by GPs as patients will remain under secondary care follow-up – until they are discharged.

Prostate and Colorectal have been live with this pathway now for over one year, with additional tumour groups coming on board during 2024. As such, you may start to see increased RMS related correspondence and we hope this email goes someway to help give context.

## 5 Targeted Lung Health Check Programme Update

Many thanks for your continued support for our Targeted Lung Health Check Programme. We continue to have one of the highest uptakes in the country.

As of 31 January 2024, we have so far invited 34,783 patients, completed 18,323 lung health checks and undertaken 7,493 scans!

It is currently running in Barking & Dagenham, Tower hamlets and Newham. The programme offers life-saving scans to residents aged between 55 and 74, and who have ever smoked.

As previously communicated, Newham was our next borough based on a combination of smoking data, current scanner location and IT integration already being in place.

#### **SNOMED Codes**

As a reminder, the new TLHC SNOMED codes have now been released by EMIS, for local practices to access. EMIS has published the knowledge base article about this, which EMIS users can access using the <u>link</u>.

### 6 FIT in secondary care

As a reminder, the Transforming Cancer Services Team in London have launched a project to promote the use of FIT in secondary care, to reduce time to diagnosis for investigation of high-risk patients with lower GI red flag symptoms.

This will use FIT to:

- identify high risk symptomatic patients in urgent care settings to reduce time to diagnosis / other investigation.
- identify low risk symptomatic patients to determine need for endoscopy / other investigation.

Posters will be displayed in urgent care settings to advise patients. **We do not expect the project to generate any additional work for GPs**. There will be a navigator who will follow up on all indeterminant tests.

## 9 NHS Jewish BRCA Testing Programme Information for Health Care Professionals

On 30 January 2023, NHS England launched a three-year programme to offer genetic testing for BRCA mutations to men and women over 18 years old with Jewish ancestry (at least one Jewish grandparent) in England.
